

From devastating diagnosis to getting back in the game, routine sports physicals are essential

uring his required, routine sports physical, Cayden Wingate received an unwanted surprise. His physician at Avera Medical Group Sibley, Dr. Park, heard something suspicious while listening to the sophomore's heart. A series of tests later revealed that the sound signaled that Cayden had a hole in his heart. It was a shock to the young, active athlete and lifelong outdoorsman—and to his family.

Cayden was referred to a cardiologist who explained the defect and the serious consequences it could pose if his heart was left untreated. Soon, a surgeon flew from Florida to Sioux Falls to perform a potentially life-saving procedure on the teen. Surgery went off without a hitch, and Cayden only needed a one-night stay in the hospital where he spent time recovering doing what teenagers do best—spending time on his phone with friends.

Just a few short weeks after heart surgery, Cayden enjoyed a snowmobiling trip to Wyoming. Soon after that, he was back on the field—playing baseball as he'd always done, without restrictions.

Cayden's mom is grateful for all the medical professionals involved in the process. "It was amazing" she said, of the care,



procedure, the providers and staff—and especially the results. And she concluded by sharing that the entire experience served as an important reminder and reinforced "just how important sports physicals can be."
