



> teve Rasche's idea of worklife balance is "go, get it done." Steve is a local farmer from Heron Lake, MN. If he isn't busy farming or hauling feed, he is traveling or indulging in one of his many hobbies. About a year ago, it seemed like all of that may change when he was diagnosed with colorectal cancer.

After a recommended preventative colonoscopy screening from his primary care physician, Steve decided to call and schedule an appointment. The procedure isn't as bad as some people think. He said. "I had to drink about a gallon of liquid the day before to clean me out. That's the fun part. They put me under and the next thing I knew I was done."

He was grateful for Dr. Connie Morrison and the caring medical team as Osceola Regional Health Center that helped make the process as smooth as possible. "Really friendly people. One nurse told me to call, day or night, with any questions I might have."

It was during this routine colonoscopy when Dr. Morrison discovered the growths on the

The road to this point has not been easy. In 2022, Bria entered her junior year with intentions of starting as point guard for the Sibley-Ocheyedan Generals. She went up for a layup and awkwardly landed on her knee resulting in immediate discomfort. This led her to seek care from an orthopedic specialist, with further imaging helping diagnose a torn ACL. As part of her recovery, intense physical therapy was recommended

to ensure proper healing in order to return to her prior level of sport activity. Bria choose to receive her care at Osceola Regional Health Center (ORHC) with regularly scheduled appointments with Kyle Ingwersen, DPT.

"Kyle sees you as so much more than a patient. He cares about you as a person. He would go out of his way to ask me, mentally, how I was doing," Bria said fondly describing her experience at ORHC. He asked her to bring a basketball to her appointment to customize her recovery by gearing it towards what she was interested in... BASKETBALL!

Ingwersen's intentionality and personalized care sparked Wasmund's interest in physical therapy. Now, fully recovered from her injury, she is starting college with over 60 hours of job shadowing experience in the field. Exceeding the amount of required grad school hours.

Zach Wessels, DPT, was also influential in Wasmund's care and schooling, "Zach helped me get in contact with other physical therapists for job shadowing and we started talking about grad school." Bria said expressing her gratitude for the staff at ORHC. "Kyle and Zach have taught me a lot and they make it fun."

Bria is looking forward to being able to help people the same way Kyle and Zach helped her. "It will be pretty rewarding to see someone go from not being able to walk to participating in sports and knowing that I was able to help them."

In an era of digital information overload, local newspapers remain a trusted source of credible, local news in our thriving community.

Gazette-Tribune is an official legal newspaper for Osceola County. It has had a long interesting history starting with Sibley's first newspaper, The Sibley Gazette, which began shortly after the town was settled in 1872. The Gazette-Tribune, as we know it today, was established after combining local newspapers into one official news source.

The Gazette-Tribune is owned and operated by Iowa Information Media Group, which is also thriving. Iowa Information is a family-owned business that was founded in 1962 by Peter W. and Connie Wagner, marking the beginning of their publishing journey first with the Golden Shopper. Since then, Iowa Information has continued to grow. The Wagner family now owns 10 local newspapers, 5 shoppers, 1 entertainment guide, OKOBOJI Magazine and White Wolf Digital Printers, which prints 179 newspapers, as well as this issue of our CREATE magazine.

"I always wanted to own the hometown paper," said Peter

Wagner about the acquisition of The Osceola County Gazette-Tribune in 2021. Connie added "Everyone seems to know us! Anywhere we go someone stops us and tells us how much they enjoy the paper."

Peter and Connie have always been passionate about their work and take great pride in being able to share that with the community.

"Newspapers are the first written history. Communities need to have the ability to look back to know where they came from, who they are and where they are going. Local news is so important," said Peter.

Peter and Connie also believe that the continued support and growth of local healthcare is equally important. The Wagner's have been supporting Osceola Regional Health Center for decades. "We were here when the hospital was built, we were original donors to the hospital. Now we value the connection
